President's report



The 2009/10 financial year saw the appointment of several new Board members, each bringing with them invaluable experience and expertise. The Society is extremely grateful for every Board member's vital contribution.

This year the Board continued to review and improve the Society's governance arrangements and developed a comprehensive range of sub-committees, including the Finance, Audit and Risk committee and the Animal Welfare Policy Review committee, to manage and address these important issues.

With the RSPCA SA headquarters (HQ) currently housed in an aging building that is unable to cater for projected future demand and growth, a working group was established to investigate the feasibility of relocation. The CEO and I met with the Minister for Environment and Conservation to discuss the possibility of government support for this initiative. Further investigation into the relocation of HQ and sourcing funding for the move will remain a priority in the year ahead.

The last 12 months have seen significant progress made on key animal welfare initiatives. Our *Choose the adoption option* campaign has experienced great results, with our shelter adoption figures up significantly from the previous year. We have publicly highlighted our opposition to jumps racing and duck hunting in South Australia and have been actively involved in national campaigns including the push to eliminate live exports.


At a national level, we have enhanced our engagement with RSPCA Australia and are currently enjoying a high level of cooperation between Australia's eight state and territory RSPCAs. In February, Board members from across Australia convened at the inaugural RSPCA National Forum. RSPCA SA hosted a subsequent RSPCA Australia Board Working Group in May to further develop future plans and activities. Dedicated to achieving a coordinated national approach to many aspects of business including fundraising, inspector training and website development, each state is looking forward to maximising efficiencies and minimising duplication of effort and resources.

A great deal of attention has been given to the conclusion of the Brinkworth case. Based on the strength of the case and our inability to proceed only due to a technicality we were bitterly disappointed at having to pay any form of costs. However, given the circumstances, the eventual outcome was better than anticipated and we have learnt some valuable lessons. The RSPCA has an outstanding record of success at investigating and prosecuting breaches of the *Animal Welfare Act*, which you will see in this report, and we will continue to bring to justice those who abuse or neglect defenceless animals. We are extremely grateful for the counsel of Marie Shaw QC who provided her services pro bono and steered us to a satisfactory outcome.

Looking forward there is much to feel confident, optimistic and excited about. On behalf of the Board and the wider South Australian community, my heartfelt thanks goes out to all RSPCA staff and volunteers, under the leadership of our CEO Steve Lawrie, for their hard work and dedication. I thank all Board members for their voluntary commitment of time, expert advice and dedication and, most importantly, I thank everyone who has supported the RSPCA by donating cash, goods and services. Without you, our work would simply not be possible.

Each year, the dedicated staff at the Lonsdale, Whyalla and Port Lincoln shelters work tirelessly to increase the number of animals adopted into loving new homes. Determined to surpass the previous year's animal adoption success, our Choose the adoption option campaign was developed and implemented with impressive results. We are incredibly proud to report that shelter staff from around the state have found new homes for more than 3800 animals this year, with the Lonsdale shelter increasing dog adoption numbers by more than 25%. A generous donation enabled the purchase of a beneficial new transport vehicle, improving our capacity to transfer animals throughout the state and between shelters, and ultimately giving all animals a greater chance of finding a new home. Emblazoned with Choose the adoption option branding, the vehicle delivers our crucial message all around the state. The key ingredient of the campaign's success is the commitment of RSPCA staff and volunteers, whose ongoing drive and desire to further improve adoption figures is highly commendable.

Our operations team attended to nearly 5000 cruelty reports, rescued more than 1400 animals in need and handled more than 40,000 calls from members of the public in the last financial year. It is clearly evident that demand for our services is growing. In fact, the number of cruelty reports investigated by our inspectorate has increased by 70% over the last five years. While this continuing trend may pose challenges in the future, we will plan strategically to ensure that RSPCA SA is well placed to meet future demand.

While it has been a busy year, we continue to rise to the challenge and deliver. RSPCA SA instigated and successfully prosecuted 31 people for cruelty and neglect this financial year; an excellent record.

CEO's report

An additional inspector was recruited, and we now have a team of 10 on the road every day of the year. Thousands of animals have benefitted from our presence for which we are incredibly proud.

The RSPCA is indebted to the staff and volunteers who work unswervingly to ensure all animals that we meet are well looked after each and every day. I am always impressed by the level of commitment and the efforts our people make for animals. From staff caring for a litter of kittens found dumped in rubbish bags to inspectors digging wombats out of collapsed burrows in 35 degree heat; this dedication ensures that we continue delivering the standard of service that the community has rightly come to expect.

To continue providing exemplary standards of care, we rely entirely on the generosity of the South Australian public. I sincerely thank everyone who has supported us throughout 2009/10 and hope that you appreciate and enjoy reading this report of our year. Together we can look forward to a very positive year ahead, during which we will achieve even more on behalf of all animals.

Business Services report



Significant progress was made during the year in relation to occupational health, safety and welfare, which included the introduction of a new policy and risk management approach for hazard identification. The majority of staff also attended training in relation to personal safety and conflict management.

An initial review of our financial procedures and practices was undertaken, which will provide guidance and prioritisation for further financial reform during the coming year.

The section provided assistance to the Chief Executive to recruit two new section heads and several other key staff during the year.



The introduction of the new federal award structure resulted in the review of all positions against new classifications prior to transitioning to new awards.

It is anticipated that in the coming year considerable efforts from the team will be focused on continued policy roll out and procedural reform.

Canine capers...

This year, a total of 1236 dogs and puppies were adopted, easily surpassing our target of 1000. Countless hours of hard work, sweat and tears contributed to such an outstanding result, invigorating all who were involved to continue pushing the limits.

At Lonsdale we pride ourselves in ensuring that there is a dog in every adoption kennel every day of the year and we go to great lengths to ensure that they all find a suitable and loving home.

Despite our best efforts, there will always be a small proportion of dogs that cannot be re-homed due to a significant deterioration in physical or mental health, which cannot be resolved or adequately managed. However, we still achieved a 99% adoption rate, which is a magnificent achievement.

Cat's got the cream...

In 2009/10, 187 more cats and kittens were adopted than the previous year. Although a welcomed increase, these figures did not meet our expectations and we will continue to identify ways to reach a satisfactory adoption level.

In collaboration with RSPCA QLD, a pilot program commenced in winter 2009, aimed at reducing the number of kittens euthanized in Queensland and meeting the demand for kittens in South Australia outside of 'kitten season'.

While South Australia experiences an influx of kittens in the warmer months, Queensland's more tropical climate results in excess kittens all year round. Many of these kittens are euthanized each year simply because of a lack of space and resources.

As part of the program, fifty-seven kittens were transferred to Lonsdale in an attempt to give them a second chance at life and find them suitable homes – and it was a great success! Not only were they all adopted, we also experienced an obvious spike in adult cat adoptions as well. We are proud to say that

we saved lots of lives last winter simply by thinking 'outside the square' and we hope to repeat the program again in the future.

Paws on wheels...

Thanks to the wonderful generosity of Shirley Brine, one of our many loyal supporters, we were able to purchase a dedicated animal transport vehicle in February to regularly transfer animals between the Lonsdale and Port Lincoln shelters.

The airconditioned Mercedes Benz Sprinter contains multiple cages of varying sizes to ensure comfortable, safe and easy transportation of animals. Although only 130 dogs were transferred in 2009/10, we are already seeing an increase in the number of adoptions, and the introduction of the new vehicle will see more frequent transfers in the next financial year.

Doctor's orders...

Every animal adopted from our shelter is vaccinated, de-sexed and micro-chipped. Record adoption figures means record numbers of animals requiring veterinary care. Lonsdale recently opened its own Vet Centre to accommodate this growing need and to improve postadoption services available to new pet owners.

To help control the number of unwanted litters in the community, the Vet Centre will soon commence cat de-sexing at concession rates for the disadvantaged, thanks once again to the outstanding generosity of Shirley Brine.

Paw behaviour...

In 2009/10, we cared for a total of 1237 animals requiring assistance, on par with last year's figures. Of these animals, nearly 50% were brought in as strays without any form of identification. Despite our best efforts to educate the local community on the importance of micro-chipping and pet identification, we continue to see a significant number of stray animals, particularly cats, and manage the constant pressure this places on our services. We endeavour to continue delivering the responsible pet ownership message in the year ahead.

The cat's meow...

Thanks to the amazing generosity of the Whyalla Cat Club our cattery facilities have been upgraded with new lighting and air conditioning. Building works for the long-awaited Cat Centre extension have now been completed, much to our cats' delight. They now have significantly larger runs to play in and more boarding cages will soon be installed.

This year we were also thrilled to receive a brand new Suzuki van. Although now covered in paw prints, it is still a much welcomed replacement for our ten year old vehicle.

In the next financial year we hope to undertake further upgrades to our facilities, including our shelter office and dog kennels.




Knock knock...

Relative to this increase was the growing number of stray and feral cats brought into the shelter, highlighting the need for continuous public education on the importance of animal de-sexing and responsible pet ownership.



A helping hand...

Port Lincoln suffered yet another devastating fire just days before Christmas, leaving many residents in search of refuge. Willing to help in any way possible, the Port Lincoln shelter provided emergency housing for pets whose families had sadly lost their homes.

Year's highlights...

The shelter underwent a number of changes this financial year to further improve the facilities and provide the most comfortable environment possible for our furry friends. The upgrade to our cattery facilities commenced and nine of our oldest kennels were replaced with brand new transportables. As the grateful recipient of a \$29,000 Mary Kibble grant we can now look forward to the construction of three new day yards in the coming year.

A highlight of the Port Lincoln social calendar is the annual Tunarama Festival, one of the largest and most popular regional festivals in Australia. We congratulate and commend this year's Miss Tunarama, Emily Rowe, who worked tirelessly to raise \$8973 for the Port Lincoln shelter.

Port Lincoln's 2010 Million Paws Walk in May was the most successful to date, attracting a record number of entrants and prize donations from generous local businesses allowed us to re-introduce entrant sponsorship. Many thanks to everyone who supported the event.

A time for celebration...

This financial year saw the shelter reach another important milestone – its 10th anniversary! Past and present volunteers, staff and committee members celebrated the occasion at the beautiful Dellacoline winery in March. A great time was had by all, and we look forward to the next 10 years with renewed energy and enthusiasm.

In recent years, the department has experienced generational change with the departure of a number of long-term team members. Although saddened by the loss of such a wealth of experience and knowledge, it has allowed the team to objectively review its activities from a fresh perspective with a new-found creative freedom.

Our new goals will be achieved by implementing more efficient processes, creating new avenues for interaction with our supporters, and actively seeking support from new segments of the South Australian community.

Achieving these objectives within the next twelve months will cement a solid foundation for more creative and innovative methods of fundraising and marketing in subsequent years.

Putting the fun into Fundraising...

As a not for profit charity organisation that receives less than 10% of its funding from the state government, the RSPCA relies on the compassion and generosity of South Australians to maintain its authoritative presence in the community and continue providing essential animal welfare services for all creatures great and small.

It's simply impossible to individually acknowledge everyone who has supported our fundraising efforts here, but for all those who have ever bought a lottery ticket, attended an event, fundraised at their office or school, responded to an appeal, donated online, volunteered their time, bought a Christmas card or baked a cupcake, we want to say THANK YOU!

Despite increasing economic pressures our supporters continued to generously donate to our calls for help through our appeals. Our direct debit program also reached record highs realising more than \$200,000 in donations in the last financial year.

Again, despite a contracting economy our Lottery still performed extremely well with only a very marginal reduction in income. Over 31,000 tickets were sold proving that this method of fundraising is still well supported in the community.

In early 2010, our fundraising activities benefited from the introduction of a more powerful, user-friendly donor database system capable of delivering more tailored communications to our supporters and greater accuracy and efficiency to our fundraising activities.

The art of being thrifty...

Thanks to a small but dedicated team of volunteers, thrift shops allow us to extend the RSPCA's reach into the community. They act as additional shop fronts for the organisation, increasing our ability to effectively communicate a message, grow our donor base and expose the brand to a wider audience.

Although not a commercial activity that would be considered core business for the RSPCA, our five thrift shops continue to be profitable and exceeded all budget targets. With an investment of time and money to ensure they represent the brand well, our thrift shops can continue to be a good source of sustainable income.

Weddings, parties, anything...

Events continue to feature prominently in most not for profit fundraising programs due to their tangible benefit to sell sponsors, create opportunities for media exposure and provide forums to gather donor information. However, they are fast becoming a less effective method of raising money due to increasing labour costs, declining volunteerism and increased pressure to deliver greater return on investment.

Marketing and Communications report

In an effort to overcome these challenges, a Business Development position has been created to secure more cash and in-kind sponsorship and assist in achieving higher margins on our events, in collaboration with the Event Coordinator.

Cupcake Day for the RSPCA in August 2009 achieved unexpected and unparalleled results. In only its second year, this event generated over \$80,000 in profit for the organisation – more than triple the previous year!

Million Paws Walk continues to be the highlight of the South Australian pet owners' social calendar, attracting more than 6000 people to Elder Park in May 2010. The financial results were also spectacular with the event raising over \$120,000 for the Society.

Securing the future...

It takes a special person to think about, and want to take care of, those that will be left behind when they pass on. Our bequestors continued their extraordinary generosity this year with the organisation receiving more than \$3.5 million from their legacies. They truly help us secure the future for the countless animals we will care for in the years ahead.

Our unique Pet Bequest Program has also captured the hearts of pet owners across South Australia. In the last financial year 19 beloved pets were permanently fostered in accordance with their owner's wishes. Six hundred more are registered with the program to ensure they are cared for by the RSPCA in the event of their owner's sudden passing or relocation to a pet-free care facility. Donations from these owners significantly contributed to the overall income from bequests this year.

Under the spotlight...

The RSPCA SA continued to nurture relationships with key media outlets during 2009/10. Although it is impossible to control what is reported in the media, it is critical that the RSPCA is accessible to journalists as

their first point of contact when an animal welfare issue arises.

A proactive media plan has been developed for the next financial year to create greater RSPCA SA media presence and visibility, more comprehensive promotion of campaigns and recognition of the many positive outcomes we regularly achieve.

The future's so bright...

The new financial year promises to bring many new challenges with equally great achievements.

A new interactive and user-friendly RSPCA SA website will be launched in late 2010 allowing us to more effectively and regularly interact with our supporters, donors and the general public, particularly the younger demographic.



Being new to the role of Operations Manager, I have spent a great deal of time reviewing the activity of the Operations team. It has been heartening to learn that this year, the team has continued to provide the high standard of service the community has rightly come to expect. In busy and often challenging times, the team has stepped up to the mark.



Inspector who...?

The RSPCA Inspectorate experienced another very busy year, responding to nearly 5000 reports of animal cruelty. The majority of these reports related to cats and dogs. Nevertheless, we have taken on some substantial cases involving livestock too. Many of these matters have now finalised but others will be before the courts in the year ahead.

During the last financial year, our small but dedicated team of Inspectors cared for more than 6100 animals. Given that we experienced a turnover of staff and had vacancies in some key positions during the year, this is a significant achievement.

An inspector's job can be extremely demanding and is often physically, mentally and emotionally exhausting. Despite the challenges and difficult situations they face on a daily basis, our inspectors continue to show unwavering commitment to animal welfare and the objectives of the RSPCA. I have quickly come to understand and appreciate the complexity of their role and am inspired by their ability to deliver consistently high standards of work.

Legal eagle...

A positive addition to the operations team has been the introduction of the Legal Officer position. We have been extremely lucky to have recruited Jed Goodfellow to the role. A source of invaluable in-house legal expertise, this position has already proven critical in successfully prosecuting breaches of the *Animal Welfare Act 1985*, while also providing a clear distinction between the Inspectorate and their investigations.

In 2009/10, RSPCA SA successfully prosecuted 31 individuals and secured more than 100 convictions. At July 2010, 13 matters were before the courts and a further 20 prosecution briefs have been submitted to the Legal Officer for review.

The finalised cases for the year related to a wide variety of matters ranging from cat hoarding to an incident involving a man savagely kicking an elderly Chihuahua to death.

Animal cruelty as a result of negligent farming practices also drew a significant degree of our attention. A highlight for the team was the successful prosecution of a farmer for mulesing more than 40 sheep in a way that contravened the *Code of Practice* for the Welfare of Sheep. A further three serious cases involving negligent farming practices are currently before the courts.

Another successful outcome was achieved against a former horse trainer and breeder who was prosecuted for starving 19 horses to the point of emaciation. The defendant was fined a record \$5,500 and ordered to pay \$5,000 in veterinary costs.

Despite these successes the RSPCA continues to be disappointed with the general level of penalties handed down by the State's Magistrates. Many of the animal cruelty cases we present to the courts can only be described as horrific but the penalties do not, in our view, always fit the crime.

The RSPCA believes that the sentences do not reflect the value the South Australian community places on the interests and lives of animals and their refusal to tolerate animal cruelty crimes. Recent amendments to the *Animal Welfare Act 1985* saw animal cruelty penalties doubled to reflect the community's feeling.

Operations and Inspectorate report

In the next financial year, our objective is to assist Magistrates in giving effect to the South Australian Parliament's intent behind these amendments. We are hopeful of seeing a significant increase in the average quantum of fines being handed down and also the institution of custodial sentences when appropriate. Achieving this would send a strong message to the community that animal cruelty is a serious crime that will not be tolerated.

Looking ahead...

To ensure we continue to meet community expectations, there will be some changes to the way in which the operations team does business.

More defined and robust procedures will be introduced to ensure a consistency of delivery across the Inspectorate, rescue officers and animal house attendants. This will allow our staff to focus solely on providing the best care possible to all animals in need and achieve the best outcomes for both owners and animals.

Further training, beyond that already provided by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, will be delivered to the Inspectors to cement their position as unparalleled animal experts.

We believe that education is the key to reducing animal cruelty in the community. This will be a focus for the operations team in the coming year. Supporting this will be a proactive linking of animal owners to human service organisations in circumstances where the mistreatment of animals is a result of mental health issues or severe disadvantage.

No one could forget the devastating Victorian bushfires in 2009. Many lessons were learnt by our interstate counterparts about how to respond to such a major disaster. To put that knowledge to good use, we will be integrating much of those learnings into our emergency response plan. The plan will also ensure a positive relationship exists between the RSPCA, emergency services and the police in the event of a similar disaster.

Over the next 12 months I am confident we will achieve significant change in the operations section as the team commits to a philosophy of continuous improvement and we work towards a model of operations that sets the benchmark for best practice.
