



# SHIRE of YARRA RANGES Domestic Animal Management Plan



#### 1.0 Executive Summary

"Against the complexities of modern life and human relationships, the relationship between owner and pet is refreshingly simple"

Local Government has long been the level of government primarily responsible for domestic animal management issues. In Victoria this responsibility has been formalised in the Domestic (Feral and Nuisance) Animal Act 1994 where it is prescribed that Councils must prepare and regularly review a Domestic Animal Management Plan. A Domestic Animal Management Plan must cover a fixed three year period and once prepared the plan must be reviewed at least annually.

This plan meets the legislative requirements of the Act and extends beyond them. An opportunity has been taken to explore the emerging issues that relate to dog and cat ownership within the Shire of Yarra Ranges.

Most importantly the goal of this plan is to achieve a balance between meeting the needs of pet owners and the needs of others in the community.



#### 1.1 Extract of Legislation

Below is an extract of Section 68A of the Domestic (Feral and Nuisance) Animals Act 1994:

## 68A. Councils to prepare domestic animal management plans

- (1) Every Council must, in consultation with the
- Secretary, prepare at 3 year intervals a domestic animal management plan.
- (2) A domestic animal management plan prepared by a Council must—
  - (a) set out a method for evaluating whether the animal control services provided by the Council in its municipal district are adequate to give effect to the requirements of this Act and the regulations; and
  - (b) outline programs for the training of authorised officers to ensure that they can properly administer and enforce the requirements of this Act in the Council's municipal district; and
  - (c) outline programs, services and strategies which the Council intends to pursue in its municipal district—
    - (i) to promote and encourage the responsible ownership of dogs and cats; and
    - (ii) to ensure that people comply with this Act, the regulations and any related legislation; and
    - (iii) to minimise the risk of attacks by dogs on people and animals; and
    - (iv) to address any over-population and high euthanasia rates for dogs and cats; and
    - (v) to encourage the registration and identification of dogs and cats; and
    - (vi) to minimise the potential for dogs and cats to create a nuisance; and
    - (vii) to effectively identify all dangerous dogs, menacing dogs and restricted breed dogs in that district and to ensure that those dogs are kept in compliance with this Act and the regulations; and
  - (d) provide for the review of existing orders made under this Act and local laws that relate to the Council's municipal district with a view to determining whether further orders or local laws dealing with the management of dogs and cats in the municipal district are desirable; and
  - (e) provide for the review of any other matters related to the management of dogs and cats in the Council's municipal district that it thinks necessary; and
  - (f) provide for the periodic evaluation of any program, service, strategy or review outlined under the plan.
- (3) Every Council must—
  - (a) review its domestic animal management plan annually and, if appropriate, amend the plan; and
  - (b) provide the Secretary with a copy of the plan and any amendments to the plan; and
  - (c) publish an evaluation of its implementation of the plan in its annual report



#### 1.2 About this Plan

This plan was developed by the Shire of Yarra Ranges Local Laws team. The Local Laws team is vested with the responsibility of providing animal control services to the Shire of Yarra Ranges.

Each year the Local Laws team receives approximately 3,000 requests for service related to animal control and management issues. The nature (and overall number) of these requests for service was analysed. The analysis evaluated requests for service recorded between the years 2003 and 2006.

The analysis identified a number of issues related to domestic animals and pet ownership specific to the Shire of Yarra Ranges.

In addition to the above a literature review was conducted with the view to identifying broader issues related to pet ownership and domestic animal management in the municipal context.

A draft plan was submitted to Council and after considering the plan a further draft was released to the public for comment. Public comment was received and evaluated by the Local Laws team prior to submitting a final draft for Councils consideration and subsequent adoption by Council.



#### 1.3 Shire of Yarra Ranges Demographic Profile

The Shire of Yarra Ranges is located on metropolitan Melbourne's eastern fringe. The Shire's population is currently estimated at 140216 people and it covers an area of almost 2,500 square kilometres. Yarra Ranges is the seventh largest local government area in Melbourne in terms of population size and the eighth largest in the state of Victoria.

The Shire balances a mixture of urban and rural communities. Around 70% of the Shire's population live in the 'urban' areas of the Shire that represents approximately 3% of its landmass. The remaining population is distributed throughout the remaining area. There are over 55 suburbs, townships, small communities and rural areas within the Shire, making it one of the most diverse of any municipality in the State.

Yarra Ranges can be characterised as a 'young' Shire with a higher than average proportion of our population aged between 5-17 years.

The dispersion of the Shire's communities significantly impacts on the cost of infrastructure and service provision, particularly to the more rural areas of the Shire. The diversity of needs within the Shire is significantly different to that experienced by other metropolitan councils.

There are approximately 6,750 businesses in the Yarra Ranges employing over 33,107 people. Economic activity in the Shire is based on tourism, manufacturing industries (in the metropolitan suburbs) and rural industries – particularly agriculture (including horticulture, floriculture and viticulture).

Approximately 80% of Shire of Yarra Ranges employees live in the Shire.



#### 2.0 Statement of Purpose

The primary purpose of this plan is to achieve a balance between meeting the needs of pet owners and the needs of others in the community.

The aims of the plan are:

- To encourage responsible dog and cat ownership through both educative and enforcement approaches;
- To support and facilitate the benefits of animal ownership and companionship;
- To increase public safety by the reduction of public and environmental nuisance caused by dogs and cats;
- To provide for the welfare of cats and dogs;
- To protect native fauna and flora from the impact of cats and dogs; and
- To provide responsive animal control services.



#### 3.0 Strategic Directions for Domestic Animal Management

The purpose of the *Domestic (Feral & Nuisance) Animals Act* is to promote animal welfare, the responsible ownership of dogs and cats and the protection of the environment. The Act specifically requires that Councils conduct a number of activities and deliver services that are designed to fulfill the purpose of the Act. The table below summarises the specific requirements of the Act and provides a reference to relevant plan actions that will achieve the requirement outcomes.

#### 3.4 Compliance & Enforcement

#### **Objective**

To maximise compliance with domestic animal laws, orders and regulations (State and Local).

#### **Current/Ongoing Activities**

The Shire of Yarra Ranges current enforcement activities include

- The investigation and prosecution of dog attacks, animal cruelty, dog rushes, barking dogs and other serious breaches of the relevant Acts
- The issuing of infringements for animals being impounded for being at large.
- The issuing of infringements where unregistered animals are impounded.
- Process excess animal permit application and issue permits where appropriate
- Dangerous/Menacing dog declarations
- Site visits to ensure compliance with declared animal requirements

The Shire of Yarra Ranges has the following Orders in place:

- S26 Domestic (Feral & Nuisance) Animal Act
   16 designated dog off lead areas
- S26 Domestic (Feral & Nuisance) Animal Act—6 designated 'No dogs & cat allowed' areas
- S26 Domestic (Feral & Nuisance) Animal Act dog must be under effective control in a public place
- Animal Control Local Law 2007 Pet owners to remove faeces from public places and a carry a means to collect faeces
- No more than two dogs or cats to be kept on a residential property

#### Planned Programs & Initiatives

3.4.1 Review dog on/off leash areas for Yarra Glen and Yarra Junction with a particular focus on environmentally sensitive areas.



#### 3.5 Domestic Animal Businesses

#### Objective

To work in partnership with domestic animal businesses to achieve Council's domestic animal management goals.

#### **Current/Ongoing Activities**

The Shire of Yarra Ranges currently has 31 registered Domestic Animal Businesses. The Shires programs/activities working with these businesses include:

#### 3.6 Declared Dogs

The Shire of Yarra ranges currently has 6 declared dogs. Programs/activities aimed at minimising the risk to the broader community from declared dangerous, restricted breed and menacing dogs include.

- Dangerous and menacing Dog declarations
- Sites visits to residential properties where dangerous dogs are house to determine compliance with relevant regulations.
- Maintenance of Dangerous Dog register
- Supply and distribution of literature and pamphlets in relation to keeping dangerous dogs

- 3.6.1 Develop an audit program to measure compliance with security and housing for declared dogs.
- 3.6.2 Review dangerous dog declaration procedure and ensure all dogs declared by Council are recorded on the Victorian Declared Dog Registry.
- 3.6.3 Actively Patrol all commercial and industrial areas to identify dogs on premises.
